DURING WORLD WAR I Cohen left the store to serve in the Army. Upon his return his father retired from the business and young Cohen assumed ownership and management. He took over the adjacent building, obtained financial backing and bought out the Reliable Furniture Co. which had been its oc-

Thus began for the Cohen Furniture Co. a period of dynamic growth under Cohen's leadership, during which time the business grew from what was started in 1879 by his father as a small store and furniture repair business into what is today the largest retail home furnishings concern in downstate Illinois.

Leaders of the furniture industry at both the manufacturing and retail level consider Cohen a pioneer in his field. In his early years he instituted policies in his business which revolutionary but are today Except for a stint as an auto standard practice with most successful furniture retailers.
